# Students Learn about Fair Housing

The Center continues to reach out to youth across Connecticut to ensure that the next generation understands their fair housing rights and the history behind housing discrimination and segregation.

Earlier this month, we partnered with the **Harriet Beecher Stowe Center** and Middletown High

School on a "Writing for Social Justice" project. We toured the Stowe House, explored the impact of

# Investigating Access to Affordable Housing in Southern CT

The Center recently received grants from the Community Foundation for Greater New Haven and Fairfield County's Community Foundation to investigate access to affordable housing in the two regions.



This new funding will enable the Center to investigate how income-restricted housing is marketed and made available to people of color across both regions and whether discriminatory policies and practices are preventing people of color and families with children from accessing affordable housing in towns with high performing schools, employment opportunities, and safe outdoor spaces. The project will also include education and outreach to ensure that area residents know their fair housing rights. The Center is grateful for for the foundations' support.
