

About Housing Discrimination

In Connecticut, it is illegal to discriminate in housing based on race, color, national origin, sex, ancestry, religion, family status or presence of children, mental or physical disability, marital status, age, sexual orientation, legal source of income (i.e., refusal to accept housing vouchers), gender identity or expression.

KEY FACTS:

- According to nationwide research, 2 million+ instances of housing discrimination occur each year, but 4 out of 5 victims do not report it.
- Disability discrimination is the mostreported type of housing discrimination in Connecticut, followed by source of income and family status.
- In tests by the Center, as many as 75% of Black renters experienced housing discrimination compared with similarlyqualified White renters.
- Discrimination perpetuates the high levels of economic & racial segregation in Connecticut.

PROTECT

- Investigate housing discrimination complaints
- Provide free legal advice and representation to victims of housing discrimination and homeowners facing foreclosure
- Conduct systemic testing and research to measure the prevalence of discrimination in Connecticut housing markets

EDUCATE

- Provide education on the fair housing laws to residents, community organizations, housing professionals, and government agencies
- Organize foreclosure prevention events to educate struggling homeowners about their options and help save homes

ADVOCATE

- Advocate for public policies and practices that protect equal access to housing, defend homeowners' rights, and foster integrated, inclusive communities
- Identify and challenge discriminatory policies and practices
