Last year - thanks to the dedication of our volunteer tutors and the generosity of our donors - Literacy Volunteers of Greater Hartford helped nearly 850 adults to improve their English literacy skills and work for better lives for themselves and their families

One of those students was Kate. Four years ago, Kate was preparing to begin a career as a dentist in her home country, Russia, But she couldn't forget the time she'd spent as a student in the United States, and dreamed of returning. So Kate made the brave decision to say goodbye to her family in Russia and begin a new life in America.

Kate soon discovered that, due to differences in training requirements between Russia and the U.S., she would need to complete two more years of residency before she would be allowed to practice dentistry here. And in order to gain acceptance to a residency program, she would have to pass the TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) exam.

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and determination. A friend told her about LVGH, and she immediately came into the Hartford Literacy Center to sign up for ESOL classes.

"Coming here has been more than just studying English," Kate says. In particular, she says that her ESOL tutor, Carol, went above and beyond. "She helped me learn how to write emails the way that Americans do. She did mock interviews with me to help prepare for my residency interviews. It would have been a nightmare to go through that without Carol's help."



After about a year of taking English classes with LVGH, Kate took and passed the TOEFL exam with flying colors. She secured an internship as a dental hygienist, and was recently accepted to a dental residency program. In two years, Kate will once again be able to practice dentistry.

"The English classes at LVGH made this possible," Kate says. "I am excited for my future in America."
